The Kolber Family's Freedom Flight

LINCROFT – Most of the flights to freedom that Eastern European Jews took during World War II went through France to England, or perhaps Switzerland to the United States. Not so for the Kolber family's incredible journey. Josef Kolber and his wife Eve fled west from Austria in 1938 and eventually settled in Shanghai, China after taking separate and hazardous routes.

"Thrown Upon the World," the new book about that improbable escape, written by Josef and Eve's grandsons, George and Charles Kolber, was launched on Aug. 1 at the Center for Holocaust, Human Rights & Genocide Education (Chhange) on the Brookdale Community College Campus.

Dale Daniels, executive director of Chhange, was delighted to welcome guests to the Education Center to meet with the Kolber broth-

ers. "About 50 people pre-registered for this book launch, but we've had over 120 show up, a tribute to the Kolber family who have generously shared some of the proceeds tonight with Chhange."

As related in "Thrown Upon the World," Josef and Eve Kolber were well-to-do owners of a sewing factory and a women's clothing retail store in Vienna. They evaded capture as the Nazis rounded up Jews after the March 1938 German "Anschluss," the annexation of Austria. Packing sewing equipment and hidden valuables in crates, Josef and his sons Dolfe and Walter set out by ship in October 1938. They traveled through the Suez Canal to India and eventually made it to the "open city" of Shanghai, one of the few which had no visa requirements for Jews leaving Austria.

Eve and daughter Lily left

soon thereafter on what would become a 46-day, 7,600-mile overland rail route. The women were delayed several times as border officials puzzled over their passports stamped with a large red "J," the German designation for Jew. The family was reunited in China in December, a month after the men got to Shanghai.

At the Chhange-sponsored book launch, Two River area residents George and wife Vita Kolber, and Charles and wife Christa Kolber greeted guests and signed the book which took them three years to write. Among the well-wishers were philanthropists Joan and Robert Rechnitz, Congressman Chris Smith, realtor Gloria Nilson, and many personal Kolber friends like Kay O'Keefe.

The nonprofit Chhange's mission is "to educate about the Holocaust, human rights,

and genocide." As such, its permanent exhibit calls attention to the Nazi atrocities, the Armenian genocide in the early 20th century, and the Rwandan horrors of 1994. Sadly, Chhange staff acknowledge they will probably supplement their current displays with other atrocities in the future. Details about the organization and exhibit hours can be found at chhange.org.

George Kolber is an accounting client and friend of Howard Dorman, the president of Chhange. This connection and a shared family history to the Holocaust resulted in the book launch. Dorman's grandparents did not survive Nazi extermination, although his parents did. Among other war-time memorabilia preserved and on display at the Chhange exhibit is the first blouse his mother, Ellen Wiener Dorman wore

after her concentration camp release.

Josef and Eve Kolber's son Walter fell in love and married a Shanghai native, Chao Chen in 1946. George and Charles are their sons. George Kolber grew up to become a prominent business leader, and a philanthropist in his own right. Charles has headed several companies to success. The circumstances of their parents' meeting in Shanghai and the brothers' own lives in the United States are all chronicled in "Thrown Upon the World," published by Archway Publishing.

Asked for comment about why this book now, George Kolber replied, "Charles and I firmly believe that it is an important story and that everyone should understand that while the Nazis were committing unimaginable atrocities against the Jews and others in Europe, the

Japanese were doing the same to the Chinese.

"We believe that hate and bias anywhere in the world is unacceptable. The Center for Holocaust, Human Rights and Genocide Education (Chhange) provides extensive programs showing the horrors of hatred and promote the fact that all people are created equal."

The Kolbers took their title from, appropriately, the German writer and statesman Johann Wolfgang von Goethe's who wrote: "Reared as we are, in quiet and peace, now all at once we're thrown upon the world."

Call it fate, serendipity, or kismet, the Kolber family odyssey and legacy is fascinating.

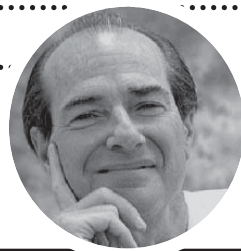
Dinner With Bob

d'Jeet?

Rating: ★★★

Can a casual restaurant with a humorous name, located in a strip mall, serving breakfast and lunch to a shopping crowd by day, with take-out and catering too, pull off a very credible dinner service at night as well? Yes, for sure, if that restaurant is d'Jeet? in The Grove in Shrewsbury.

A bit of a split personality is evident when perusing the regular menu and the 'Specials' listings. There is still an ample selection of sandwiches and burgers available once the sun goes down, but there is also a sheet of daily specials featuring very tasty seasonal, local cuisine. By day, the line is out the door; by dinnertime the pace slows and the bright, cheerful atmosphere of this BYO is mellow and relaxed, all the better to enjoy the creative dishes of chef/owner Casey Pesce. There's even live music on Friday nights.

While perusing the menu, we thoroughly enjoyed an order of Baba Ghanoush (\$8); a creamy blend of roasted eggplant, tahini (sesame-based sauce), parsley, sumac, olive oil, lemon and garlic, with triangles of toasted pita bread for dipping.

A generous bowl of Local Heirloom Tomato Salad (\$12/14) featured hunks of farm fresh tomatoes, cucumber, shaved onion, local greens, Frico (thin, crispy

pieces of baked parmesan cheese), fennel and a sprightly lemon basil vinaigrette. A very tasty combination starring juicy New Jersey tomatoes!

Local New Jersey Button (\$15), served in a deeply flavorful tomato-saffron broth, with toasted sourdough bread, was a home run – named DOTN (dish of the night) by two of my guests. A bit smaller than littlenecks, these clams were sweet, tender, grit free, and had absorbed a hint of the smoked paprika in the broth, making for a dish of surprising complexity, and one

which required sopping up every last drop of that broth.

We liked the Soup D'Jour (\$7/\$9), a Vegan Vegetable, tomato-based, fennel and Couscous combination, for its fresh taste and chunky texture, but would have preferred the couscous to have been cooked a little less.

I didn't expect the Crab Toast (\$14) to be as impressive as it was. A bountiful portion of lump crabmeat with roasted garlic aioli, sat atop grilled sourdough bread, and was dressed with slices of heirloom tomatoes and fennel fronds. This deceptively sim-

ple dish was elevated to a whole other level by the purity and freshness of the sweet crabmeat. Bravo!

Crispy Calamari Salad (\$16); chicory, oven-roasted tomatoes, pickled red onion, shaved pecorino cheese, in a lemon-caper vinaigrette, was tasty, but would have been better balanced, and more enjoyable, with less salad and more calamari.

Fish D'Jour, Grilled Local Bluefin Tuna (\$38), presented two smallish squares of perfectly seared rare tuna, which had been marinated in chermoula (cumin based), with whipped labne (thick-strained yogurt) sauce, toasted pistachio pieces, and a side of sliced local yellow and green squash.

All of the pastas are homemade and the Traditional Cheese Ravioli (\$24), filled with mozzarella and ricotta, and topped with pomodoro sauce, basil and shaved pecorino was superb. Plump, tender, packets of al dente pasta, were bathed in a slight-chunky fresh tomato sauce, which had just the right amount of zip.

A special of Grilled Rib Eye Steak (\$36) was dressed with caramelized shallot butter, and shared the plate with wedges of skin-on steak fries, and sautéed local kale.

Francois Raveneau is one of the best producers of Chablis in France, and his bottle of

2009 Foret Premier Cru was further proof that his sterling reputation is well deserved. Undercurrents of lemon-lime citrus mingled with tropical fruits, made for good minerality, with a trace of fullness, which worked well with the appetizers, especially the button clams and crab toast.

We opened two reds: on the leaner, crisper, and lighter side (think Barolo or Burgundy), a 2013 Cos Cerasuolo Di Vittoria from Sicily, a blend of native Frappato and Nero d'Avola grapes, was bright and cherry-like, with a long finish, and paired well with the tuna and pasta. Some in our group preferred the 2014 Cameron Hughes Lot 530, matched with the tuna and rib eye; a California blend of Syrah and Grenache, which had more weight (bigger mouthfeel)

and was far fruitier and richer, but had no secondary characteristics and seemed a bit monochromatic. In the end it was simply a matter of personal preferences.

Homemade Ice Cream (\$8) for dessert? No way could we resist sampling some flavors! I really liked the Oatmeal Cookie and the Vanilla Bean. Toasted Marshmallow had a nice caramelized flavor, and the Chocolate-Covered Strawberry was very fruity.

Sure, you can go shopping at The Grove and have a great lunch at d'Jeet?, but you really should go back one night to explore their sophisticated specials! It's a totally different experience!

championship during his senior year. The balance of the festival will include short and features that have been chosen by founder Nicholas Marchese and the MFF programming team led by Nicholas Calisti and Kent Turner from the many dozens they have watched this year.

The Monmouth Film Festival team has worked throughout the year to bring top quality films for these upcoming three days. The result is that their festival has begun to be ranked near the top with Sundance Film Festival.

six more feature films along with a wide variety of shorter films from several dozen countries. Top professionals will be on the panels to explore the films for audiences.

Filmmakers, artists, agents, press and surprise guests on the program will mingle and present workshops for young people who are exploring the options in the movie industry. Movie-lovers who want to watch films will have plenty to experience on the main screen. A feast of features, documentaries, animated-works, and all kinds of shorter movies – most of them being shown in public for the first time – will be offered.

Scene On Film

'Mission Impossible - Fallout'

Rated PG-13

Tom Cruise and writer/director Christopher McQuarrie have nailed us to our seats with suspense - again. As the credits roll for "Mission: Impossible - Fallout," you are likely to sit immobile in your seat in wonderful fear. If that sounds crazy, it is.

The tale unfolds in Belfast, Berlin, Paris and London and we follow as the action moves through all the monuments we recognize and love. The secret, as always, is to forgive ourselves for not understanding the plot or the characters. Just listen to the music and watch Tom race through the explosions. The predictably violent sound track is a constant warning of what lies ahead.

Here's the setup: Terrorist John Lark has designed a plan for the destruction of the world with three nuclear spheres that will do the job when one person has all three, plus the key to ignite one. Lark's plans are being carried out by his supporters, The Apostles. Where is the missing plutonium ball? That's the gut of the film. Can Tom Cruise find it and save

the world? Don't worry about the world or the details or the confusing identities. Just watch the inventive tricks as they unfold.

Watch for a Paris bathroom scene of confined bloody violence, a nightclub scene of the same, and enjoy

the sight of each horrifying switch unfolding under amazing light. We're never sure who is good, who is evil. Watch Vanessa Kirby as "the white widow," Henry Cavill as CIA operative Walker, villain Solomon Lane (Sean Harris) and enjoy a fine turn by Alec Baldwin as Tom Cruise's boss. Baldwin drops a strong note of wisdom into the otherwise ridiculous happenings.

Whether Tom Cruise is riding a bike against traffic in a Paris tunnel or dodging bullets everywhere, the tension spirals up. Why are we caught when we know the whole thing is ridiculous? It's simple. Cruise doing the impossible, especially in the melodramatic, ludicrous finale that absorbs a whole theater.

Why, I asked myself, am I sitting here tied in knots about whether he will fall off a cliff, be hit by a truck or shot by a traitor when I know

perfectly well none of that will happen? The reality of that is the music, the extraordinary filming, and the colors, all of which create tension very successfully. Don't even wonder who is who; it doesn't matter a whit.

One appealing thing in all the violence: Tom Cruise's Ethan Hunt, for all his tough guy stuff, cares far more about one man or woman in danger than he does about the end of the whole world, and as he protects each one, we begin to like him. The plot? Forget it. Just look for the hints of good and bad in the characters. And feel yourself sinking into your chair hoping you can just disappear. And I ask this favor: During the last 20 minutes, see how much you can watch before slamming your eyes shut in fear.
